
My latest interest: Recently I decided to get a weather station. Which was fun until the array was blown down in the high winds we had a while back. Replacement array is coming soon.

Upcoming ARES Event

Pennsylvania Selected for National Mass Care Exercise

Each year FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency) selects one state to conduct the National Mass Care Exercise. In 2024 Pennsylvania has been selected. FEMA and PEMA (Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency) are working together to make this statewide exercise a success. They will be opening a state-run shelter in Shippensburg, PA on May 21st. In order to make this exercise as realistic as possible PEMA has reached out to The American Red Cross to participate. In PA, there are 2 Red Cross organizational regions. SEPA (South East PA) comprises Philadelphia, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, and Montgomery Counties. GPA (Greater PA) comprises the rest of the state.

Pennsylvania Red Cross has elected to expand on the NMCE to further drill and educate its volunteers and staff. The weekend before the state-run shelter (May 18/19) Red Cross is holding a Disaster Training Institute in Shippensburg called "Ship Shape". Ship Shape will involve two days of classes for Red Cross staff and volunteers on a variety of subjects aimed at increasing readiness for, response to, and recovery from disasters.

Additionally, the Pennsylvania Red Cross has decided to hold an expanded sheltering exercise on May 22nd. which will include the demonstration of emergency communications abilities. The SEPA and GPA Emcomm teams along with EPA and WPA ARES are collaborating on a series of exercises and drills leading up to and including the main exercise.

Some portion of these exercises will take place on local repeaters (including the W3QV repeater). Other portions will involve HF and digital communications. The idea is to test and demonstrate all forms of communication that the emergency communications teams are capable of using and fall within their Standard Operating Procedures. These exercises will also introduce PA hams to the newly opened Red Cross Emcomm Stations (RCES) located in each of the Red Cross Pennsylvania Disaster Response Areas.

While some elements of the exercise will be directed at Red Cross EmComm members, others will be open to all members of the PA ham community.

The dates of the upcoming exercises are:

March 16, 1-4pm – RCES check in by PA hams via local repeaters.

April 6 - The Spring ARES Simulated Emergency Test

May 4 – Emergency Communications Exercise Dry Run

May 22 – National Mass Care/Red Cross Exercise – ARC Shelter Messaging

The details and times of these events will continue to develop and be announced ahead of time. One feature of the NMCE on May 22nd is to not know the details of the exercise. It is to develop as a real disaster would. But mark your calendars that there will be something happening that day!

Here are some of the contests and special events coming up in March, a busy contesting month with plenty of on-the-air activity. March starts and ends with big ones and also has some state QSO parties too.

Mar. 1 - Mar 3

ARRL International DX Contest, SSB - 0000Z Mar. 2 - 2400Z Mar. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. Worldwide, Rules:http://www.arrl.org/arrl-dx. U.S. and Canadian stations work worldwide DX stations. A great to chance work DX on SSB. There will be lots of DX stations seeking US stations. Add to your DXCC count and work DX on every band. 10 Meters in particular has had great propagation and every license class can be on it. This is a huge contest and the band will be hopping. Try out your HF phone skills.

Mar. 9 - Mar 11

South America 10 Meter Contest. 1200Z Mar. 9 - 1200Z Mar. 10. SSB, CW. Worldwide. Rules; http://sa10m.com.ar/wp/rules/. To encourage worldwide activity on 10 Meters with emphasis on South American stations. 10 Meters is a great band for working South America. Another chance to take advantage of current propagation.

Stew Perry Topband Challenge. 1500Z Mar. 9 - 1500Z Mar.10. 160 Meters. CW. Worldwide. Rules:http://www.kkn.net/stew/. A contest to encourage operation on 160 Meters with points based on distance between stations. A simpler contest sometimes described as "a boy and his radio". If you can get your antenna to tune 160 you can work a lot of stations before warmer weather raises noise levels on 160.

Oklahoma QSO Party. 1500Z Mar. 9 - 0200Z Mar. 10 and 1500Z Mar. 10 - 2100Z Mar. 10. 80, 40, 20, 15, 10 and 6 Meters. SSB, CW, Digital (no FT8). Rules:http://k5cm.com/okqp.htm. Described as "OKQP for the fun of it". Another chance to pickup a new state for your Worked All States. No FT8 but PSK is allowed, so look for those digital stations to try your DENN skills.

Idaho QSO Party. 1900Z Mar. 9 - 1900Z Mar. 10. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters, SSB, CW, Digital (no FT8). Rules:https://www.idahoqsoparty.org/. Idaho is rarer state on the air. It was the last state I need for WAS on phone. I got what I needed in this contest. Pick up that elusive ID QSO

Wisconsin QSO Party. 1800Z Mar. 10 - 0100Z Mar.11. All bands except WARC. SSB, CW, Digital (no FT8). Rules: http://www.warac.org/wqp/wqp.htm. Another state QSO party for your WAS total.

Mar. 16 - Mar. 18

Russian DX Contest. 1200Z Mar. 16 - 1200Z Mar.17. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. SSB, CW, Worldwide. Rules: http://www.rdxc.org/asp/pages/rulesg.asp. Russia has a huge ham population and they will be active, many with huge signals and excellent operators.

Virginia QSO Party. 1200Z Mar. 16 - 0400Z Mar.17, 1200Z - 2400Z Mar.17. All bands except WARC. CW, SSB, Digital (including FT8/FT4). Rules:https://www.qsl.net/sterling/VA_QSO_Party/2024_VQP/2024_VQP_Main.html. A chance to pickup another state even on 6 or 2 Meters. Look for FT8 and FT4 activity in this one.

Mar. 23 - Mar. 24

North American SSB Sprint Contest. 0000Z - 0400Z Mar. 24. 80, 40 and 20 Meters. Worldwide. Rules:http://ssbsprint.com/rules/. Focused on North American stations. A quick sprint to pickup some new states, provinces or countries.

Mar. 30 - Mar.31

CQ World-Wide WPX Contest, SSB. 0000Z Mar. 30 - 2359Z Mar. 31. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. Worldwide. Rules:https://www.cqwpx.com/rules.htm. Work everyone on HF bands. A big contest with lots of activity. The phone bands will be busy and they need you in the log. Also, look for that 10 Meter DX.


