What is contesting?

Contesting is operating over a specific time period to make contacts with certain objectives and complete the exchange of information:

- Work specific regions – States, Countries, Continents, Zones.
- Work specific bands – 160 Meters, VHF Contests, 10 Meter Contests.
- Work specific modes – SSB, CW, RTTY, PSK, FT8.
- Work call sign prefixes.
- Some contests are sprints – Limited Operating Time
 - 1 hour, 12 hour
- Power level – QRP (5 Watts or less), low power (100 Watts), KW

Why do we contest?

- Improve our operating skills.
- Test our radios and antennas.
- Learn about band propagation.
- Promote activity on bands or modes.
- Work new states, counties, countries, grids.
- Be the station everyone needs – state, county, country, grid square, prefix.
- Challenge yourself – score better than last time.

Who can contest?

Any license class can participate in a contest.

- VHF contests allow FM Simplex contacts.
- All license classes have privileges on 10 Meters in addition to VHF/UHF bands.
- Technician class licenses have CW privileges on 80, 40, 15 and 10 Meters. Try CW.
- Contests have a class for QRP low power stations.
- Many contests have a Rookie category.
- There are several ARRL Rookie contests.
- Assist a control operator with a higher class license.



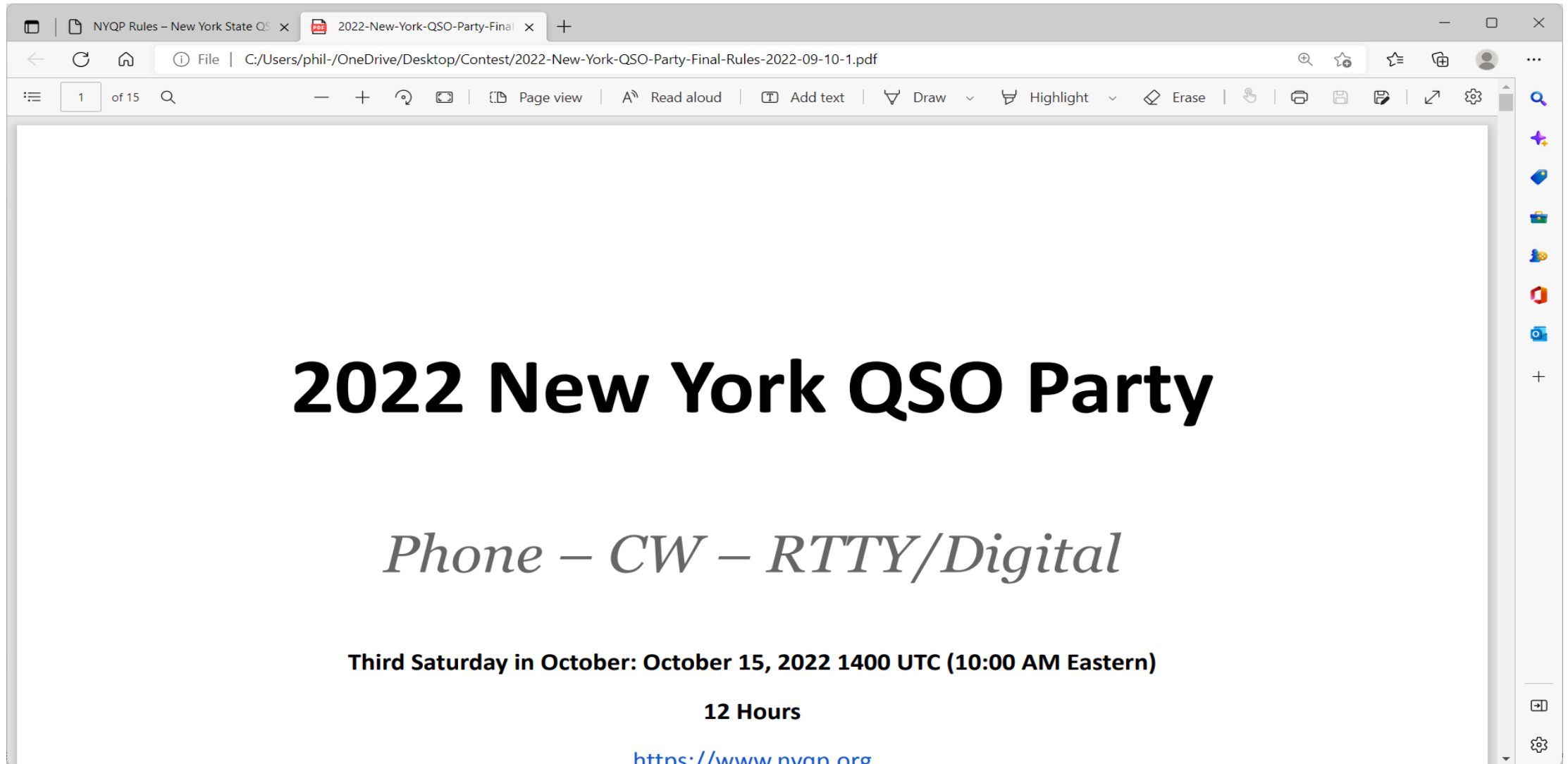

- Can my station operate on the bands and modes for the contest?
- Do I want to operate only a few hours or a whole weekend?
- Do I want to only operate in the daytime or all hours of the day?
- Is there an operator category that suits my interests and experience?
- Do I want to be a casual participant or go all out?
- Can I participate without sending in a log?
- Do I have logging software for a contest?

What do I need to be in a contest?

- Radio and antenna for the band/bands you will operate on.
- PC for logging.
- Logging software (prevent dupes, create contest entry)
- Popular programs
 - N1MM+ – free download
 - DXLog – free download
 - N3FJP – \$8.99 for single contest, \$59.99 for all
- Spare time – it can take up much of your weekend if you get caught up in it.

- Participate in a multi-operator effort with a local ham. With a control operator you can operate on their license class with their call.

My history as a tester

KN9FRC in February, 1962 Novice Roundup



Those certificates and DX QSLs reveal that WV6SBO had quite a Novice career. In 8 months as a Novice, Bill received WAC, WBE, plus 17 other choice DX certificates, and had 60 countries confirmed . . . besides topping all other entries in the 1962 ARRL Novice Roundup.

1962 Novice Roundup Results

THE 11th ARRL Novice Roundup was a lulu. This contest, held February 3-18, 1962, was the time for Novices to participate in a contest geared to our newer hams. The objective was to work as many stations in as many different ARRL sections as possible . . . with the side effects of helping build up the code speed for the General/Conditional examination, as well as gain proficiency and skill in operating procedures. The NR combines fun and learning. This year 228 Novice reports were received. A hearty thanks to the Generals who helped out with the contacts and multipliers, including the 66 who reported results.

California has had its share of Novice Roundup winners in the past, and this year the Golden Bear state produced San Diego's WV6SBO with 20,345 points with 313 contacts in 65 sections, *f.b.!* These contestants showed real operating ability with these scores over 10,000:
