July POTA-Mania

July POTA-Mania was a great time, as it always is when we get to operate outside at the park! The weather conditions were not ideal but we still persevered and managed to put the park on the air.

The temperature hovered around 75 degrees with the humidity at 82% and the rain varied anywhere from a drizzle to a downpour for most of the day.

Thankfully we had the pavilion and were able to stay comfortable and dry while we operated.

In total we had 2 operating stations and 4 guests who stopped by throughout the day.

One of our guests was Greg WA3GM, who I was very happy to see back in his home POTA park at US-1352!

The two stations that had set up and operated were Andrew (W3AWC) and myself (KC3UKC) and between the two of us we managed to put 50 contacts in the log that were a mix of CW and SSB.

There was also some antenna experimentation with a 25' telescoping whip that allowed Andrew to qualify for his N1CC award with the Parks on the Air program.

The N1CC award is for stations that have operated on 10 different bands from a single park, and we were able to get Andrew on 30m, 17m and 80m to fill out the remaining bands needed. Congratulations Andrew!

The band conditions were unpredictable as they have been for the last few months, there was a lot of activity to be heard but there was a lot of fading of these same strong signals.

20m was in relatively good shape, despite the QSB, and allowed for a contact with stations in New Mexico and Curacao!

15m on the other hand was like an on/off switch and open to relatively close regional contacts.

For example, during my time calling CQ on 15m I worked 7 stations but 5 of them were in Michigan!

This is not a behavior I have experienced with 15m before, but it allowed me to get a few new states on 15m that I did not previously have.

Between summer vacations, the forecast and the strange band conditions I think a lot of folks were not able to make it out, but POTA-Mania was a great success and I look forward to seeing everyone next month!

PMRC International Lighthouse Weekend August 16 – 17, 2025

Phil-Mont Mobile Radio Club will again celebrate International Lighthouse Weekend by operating W3EM portable at the Turtle Rock Lighthouse along the Schuylkill River Trail,

Saturday & Damp; Sunday, August 16 and 17 th. The lighthouse is the last building along Boathouse Row on the eastern shore of the Schuylkill River in Philadelphia. Our station will be adjacent to the Schuylkill River bike trail which is very busy on summer weekends with cyclists, walkers and runners.

The setup will basically be a POTA type station operating mostly 20 and 40 meter SSB and CW. 120VAC is available from the Lighthouse. Setup will start BOTH DAYS at 8:00 a.m. and we will operate through mid-afternoon. We're looking for volunteers to participate and give whatever time you can. Free 3-hour parking is available along Kelly Drive in the morning but quickly fills.

There are no parking restrictions along Sedgley and Lemon Hill Drives.

This event is not a contest but of course we want to make as many contacts as we can. Our purpose is to promote Ham Radio, Phil-Mont Mobile Radio Club and public awareness of lighthouses and their need for preservation and restoration. And at the same time, enjoy ourselves playing radio while engaging the public. We'll have company on the air. Typically, over 400 lighthouses participate from dozens of countries. And bring your HT as well to demonstrate how repeaters work.

The 2025 MARC Hamfest will be on Sunday August 10th at the Kimberton Fire Company grounds, Route 113 (742 Pike Springs Road) (GPS: 40.12748, -75.56726) west of the intersection with Route 23 in Kimberton, PA.


The map shows that Kimberton is northwest of King of Prussia and just west of Phoenixville, PA. Talk-in is available on the MARC linked repeater systems with coverage to the north and west and near Kimberton provided by 145.13 MHz PL 131.8 repeater in Paoli PA and to the south and east by 147.06 MHZ PL 131.8 repeater in Newtown Square PA.

Doors open for sellers not before 0700 and for buyers at 0800. Doors close at 1200. Admission is \$10 and entitles you to a door prize ticket. Sellers have an outdoor tailgate space for \$8 (one car width, head -in parking) not including admission. An indoor table is available for \$10 each for 1 to 4 tables or \$8 each for 5 or more tables not including admission. Reservations for indoor tables are required by emailing hamfest@marc-radio.org. The 2025 Hamfest flyer is here.

Food and beverage sales are provided by authorized vendors only. Unlicensed children and spouse with a licensed Ham admission are free.

Here is the contest calendar report for August, a mix of QSO Parties, some DX contests and even RTTY and Digital.

August 2 - August 3

10 - 10 International Summer Contest, SSB - 0001Z Aug. 2 - 2359Z Aug.3. Worldwide. 10 Meters only, SSB. Rules: http://www.ten-ten.org/index.php/activity/2013-07-22-20-26-48/qso-party-rules. Another of the 10 - 10 Club contests for getting hams active on 10 Meters. Ten is still good most days in this part of the Sunspot Cycle so get on and make some phone contests. You don't need to be a member.

North American QSO Party, CW - 1800Z Aug 2 - 0559Z Aug. 3. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters, CW, 100 Watts maximum. Rules:https://www.ncjweb.com/NAQP-Rules.pdf. A short CW sprint where stations work North America. Make a few CW contacts.

August 9 - August 10

Maryland-DC QSO Party - 1400Z Aug.9 - 0400Z Aug.10. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. CW, Phone. Rules:https://www.w3vpr.org/Maryland-DC_QSO_Party. Make some QSOs with a neighboring state. Sometimes these close ones can be hard to get. They call it "The Fun Contest". Expect some Rover and Portable stations, possibly POTA actuations.

Kentucky State Parks on the Air - 1400Z - 2200Z Aug. 9. 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. CW, Phone, Digital. Rules:https://k4msu.com/kypota/. Also includes National Parks for a total of 59 parks. Expect to work a lot of POTA stations.

50 MHz Fall Sprint - 1800Z - 2300Z Aug. 9. 6 Meters only, Analog, Digital. Rules:https://packratvhf.com/2025_Fall_Sprint_Rules.pdf, This one is sponsored by our friends the Pack-Rats, the Mt. Airy VHF Club. This is a local event so work some locals on 6 Meter on any modes. Great chance for Technicians to try a contest.

NCCC 55th Anniversary Fiesta - 1900Z Aug. 9 - 0300Z Aug. 10. 40, 20 and 15 Meters. CW, Phone, RTTY. Rules:https://nccc.cc/55th.html. An event celebrating 55 years of the Northern California Contest Club. Look for some special 1 X 1 callsigns. Maybe try some RTTY.

August 16 - August 17

North American QSO Party, SSB - 1800Z Aug. 16 - 0559Z Aug. 17. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. SSB only. 100 Watts maximum. Rules:https://www.ncjweb.com/NAQP-Rules.pdf. Another of the sprint contests but this one SSB. North American stations are the target. Simple contest exchange just name and state.

ARRL Rookie Roundup, RTTY - 1800Z - 2359Z Aug.17. 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters, RTTY only, 100 Watts maximum. Rules:https://www.arrl.org/rookie-roundup.An event to encourage newer operators to get on the air using RTTY. Experienced ops work the rookies. See rules for rookie categories.

Hawaii QSO Party - 0400Z Aug. 23 - 0400Z Aug. 25 - 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. CW, Phone, Digital. Rules:http://www.hawaiiqsoparty.org/. A contest promoting activity in Hawaii. A great chance to work Hawaii stations on multiple bands/modes. Hawaii can sometimes be a tough one to work, so this event will see a lot more activity from HI stations.

Ohio QSO Party - 1600Z Aug. 23 - 0400Z Aug. 24. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. CW, SSB. Rules:http://www.ohqp.org/index.php/rules/. Work Ohio's 88 counties. Not a rare state but probably an easy one to work on 160, 80 or 40 Meters.

CVA DX Contest, SSB - 1800Z Aug. 23 - 2100Z Aug. 24, 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. SSB. Rules:https://cvadx.org/. This one is a Brazilian contest sponsored by the Brazilian Army Communications School, an event to celebrate Brazilian Soldier's Week. Brazil has a very active ham community so expect a lot of activity with good operators.

August 30 - August 31

U.S. Islands QSO Party - 1200Z Aug. 30 - 0300Z Aug. 31. 160, 80. 40, 20, 15, 10 and 6 Meters, CW, Phone, Digital. Rules:http://usislands.org/qso-party-rules/. This contest includes all U.S. island territories so look for some activity from some of those Pacific islands. A good chance for some DX.

Worldwide Digi DX Contest - 1200Z Aug. 30 - 1200Z Aug. 31. Worldwide. 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 Meters. FT8/FT4 modes. Rules:https://ww-digi.com/. A Slovenian sponsored contest to promote use of digital modes. A good chance to work some DX on FT8 or FT4.

Colorado QSO Party - 1300Z Aug. 30 - 0400Z Aug. 31. All bands except WARC (60, 30, 17 and 12 Meters). CW, Phone, Digital. Rules:http://ppraa.org/coqp, Work stations in 64 CO counties with stations working as Rover or Portable.

Kansas QSO Party - 1400Z Aug. 30 - 0200Z Aug, 31, 1400Z - 2000Z Aug. 31. 80, 40, 20, 15, 10 and 6 Meters. CW, Phone, Digital/RTTY. Rules:https://ksqsoparty.org/rules/KSQPRules2024.pdf?1. Work KS stations in 105 counties. See contest rules for some special certificates for working 1 X 1 stations.



Here are some highlights from this month in Blurb history, August 1965...



FIELD DAY 1965 RESULTS
